The Athens City Council will take an initial vote this evening on whether to allow beer sales at special events in Athens, such as Pumpkintown and the Sounds of Summer concerts. Event organizers, Tim Hughes and Meredith Willson, are asking the Council to change the city's beer code to allow beer sales at festivals and other public events. The proposed ordinance would allow beer permits to be issued only to non-profit, charitable, or political organizations. The Council would review and vote on each application to sell beer at an event. Council members will vote on the first reading of the ordinance tonight at 6 p.m.

Athens Utilities Board says that power rates for January will go down, but only by a tiny amount; about 1/10th of a cent per kilowatt hour. Meanwhile, winter begins this Thursday, December 21st at 11:28 a.m. Eastern. That usually means higher energy use and higher wintertime electric bills. AUB says there are some steps you can take to save energy and money. First, keep your thermostat at 68 degrees and dress warmly indoors. Use inexpensive weather stripping on doors and windows to eliminate drafts and keep doors and windows closed at all times possible. Also, ensure there is adequate insulation in your attic; put an insulating blanket on your water heater and clean or replace your HVAC system filters every month.
