BEER AT FESTIVALS PASSES FIRST VOTE

The Athens City Council has approved the sale of beer at downtown festivals and concerts on the first of two readings. The vote was 3 to 2. If approved at the January council meeting, the sale of beer will be allowed at such events as Pumpkintown and the Sounds of Summer concert series. Each application to sell beer will have to be approved by the Council on a one-by-one basis. The Council also voted 4 to 1 on a motion to modify the beer code which would likely ease some of the restrictions on distance requirements for future beer permit applicants.

The Council also heard the reports from the police and fire departments on activity during November:

• Police Chief Cliff Couch reported that police investigated 45 thefts, 13 burglaries, 13 assaults, seven motor vehicle thefts, and three sex offenses in November. There were 79 traffic accidents with four injuries. Officers issued 207 tickets for moving violations. At the end of November, there were seven vacancies on the Police Department. However, five new officers have been hired since then.

 \blacklozenge Thousands of Army recruits travelled through Atlanta's Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport on Tuesday on their way home for the holidays. They are among the 40,000 Army soldiers nationwide given a break from training to spend the holidays at home with their families.

◆ Eleven House Republicans mainly from California, New York, and New Jersey, and one from North Carolina, voted against the GOP's \$1.5 trillion measure that rewrites the nation's tax code which is the largest overhaul of the tax code in 30 years. The vote was 227-203.

TUESDAY'S MARKET REPORT: U.S. stocks finished lower following the passing of the tax bill in the House on Tuesday afternoon. Investors are likely taking some profits following the recent strength in stocks from optimism on the expected tax legislation.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average was down 37 points or 0.2% to 24,755. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index was down 9 points or 0.3% to 2,681, and the NASDAQ Composite Index was down 31 points or 0.4% to 6,964.

In Commodity Markets, the spot price of gold fell 0.04 to 1,262.36, and the price of crude oil rose 0.30 to 57.46. In Bond Markets, the 30-year Treasury yield closed higher at 2.81% and the 10-year Treasury yield finished higher at 2.45%.
