ATHENS CITY NEW YEAR'S SCHEDULE •

In observance of New Years, the Athens Municipal Building, Public Works, Recycle Center, and Animal Shelter will be closed on Monday, January 1st, 2018. Those offices will re-open on January 2nd during regular business hours. The residential garbage routes will be as follows: The Monday, January 1st, route will be picked up on Tuesday, January 2nd. All other routes will be on the regular schedule.

♦ PROPERTY TAX DEADLINE APPROACHES If you want to pay your City of Athens property taxes before the end of the calendar year for income tax purposes, remember the taxes must be paid prior to 5 p.m. this Friday, December 29th, or postmarked prior to midnight on December 31st, 2017.

APD TARGETING IMPAIRED DRIVERS

Through the end of the year, the Athens Police Department is partnering with the Tennessee Highway Patrol to increase enforcement of impaired driving. Officers will be paying special attention in an attempt to remove impaired drivers from the roadways. Police will be looking for traffic violations that are specific indicators of possible intoxicated drivers. Drivers need to be aware that the consequences of a single DUI conviction for a first -time offender in Tennessee may include costly fines, court costs, legal fees, jail time, and mandatory drug and alcohol treatment.



TUESDAY'S MARKET REPORT: U.S. stocks closed mostly lower. Information technology was the worst-performing sector in the S&P 500, while energy stocks posted the largest gains. The Dow Jones Industrial Average was down 8 points or 0.0% to 24,746. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index was down 3 points or 0.1% to 2,681, and the NASDAQ Composite Index was down 24 points or 0.3% to 6,936.

TODAY IN HISTORY - DECEMBER 27TH

1822 - French scientist Louis Pasteur was born. He invented the process of pasteurization to preserve milk and other foods.

1845 - Dr. Crawford Williamson Long used anesthesia for childbirth for the first time, when he delivered his own child in Jefferson, Georgia.

1900 - Carrie Nation staged her first raid on a saloon at the Carey Hotel in Wichita, Kansas. She broke every one of the liquor bottles in sight. Nation usually did her damage with a hatchet; calling her vandalism, hatchetation.

1927 - The Jerome Kern and Oscar Hammerstein II musical, "Show Boat" debuted in New York City. Its star, Helen Morgan, received excellent reviews from critics of the show, a musical about riverboat show people and their romances and disappointments.

1947 - "Hey kids... What time is it? It's Howdy Doody time!" Buffalo Bob (Smith), Clarabelle the Clown (Bob Keeshan), Judy Canova and a host of others joined "Howdy Doody" for the show's debut on NBC-TV. The show stayed on the air for 13 years.
