♦ ETOWAH GETS RECYCLING GRANT

The Tennessee of Department of Environment and Conservation has awarded over \$6 million in grants to support community recycling efforts in a statewide effort to reduce landfill waste. The city of Etowah will receive a \$9,500 grant for a used oil heater.

◆ An American citizen from California has been arrested overseas on charges of providing material support to terrorists. Bernard Raymond Augustine, 20, was arrested in Tunisia while in the process of trying to enter Libya to join the Islamic State terrorist group.

◆ The reported number of anti-Semitic incidents increased in the United States by 57 percent last year, according to a new report from the Anti-Defamation League. There were a total of 1,986 anti -Semitic incidents in 2017, which included reports of harassment and bomb threats, vandalism and physical assaults.

♦ Georgia's lieutenant governor, Casey Cagle, and its state senate are fighting back against Atlanta-based Delta Airlines' decision to sever ties with the National Rifle Association by ending their contract for discounted rates. Delta has also requested that the NRA remove their information from its website. Cagle pledged to kill any tax legislation that benefits the company unless it reverses course and realigns with the pro-Second Amendment organization.

TUESDAY'S MARKET REPORT: U.S. stocks edged lower as investors saw Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell's optimistic view on the U.S. economy as a sign that interest rates might increase four times, rather than three, in 2018. The Dow Jones Industrial Average was down 299 points or 1.2% to 25,410. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index was down 35 points or 1.3% to 2,744, and the NASDAQ Composite Index was down 91 points or 1.2% to 7,330.

CORKER DECIDES NOT TO RUN AGAIN

Senator Bob Corker is throwing in the towel on efforts to re-enter the U.S. Senate race after announcing last fall he would retire. His long-time chief of staff, Todd Womack, says Corker had been encouraged by people across Tennessee to reconsider his decision not to seek a third term amid an ongoing public quarrel with President Trump. Womack says they spent the last few days looking for a clear path for re-election, but at the end of the day, the senator will be leaving the Senate when his term expires at the end of 2018. Several polls show him losing to Republican Congressman Marsha Blackburn, who entered the race after Corker announced he would not seek a third term.

Athens Student Wins Award
