

# **Juvenile Charged With Threats**

A 16-year-old McMinn County boy faces charges in connection with online threats against a student at Niota Elementary School. Sheriff Joe Guy says several individuals had been arguing and threatening each other on social media last Thursday night, and some of the threats were directed to an 8th grade student. The Niota School Resource Officer, Ashley McClendon, spoke with the student who showed her the posts. She notified the principal. An investigation showed the threats came from a 16-year-old home school student. The student was quickly located at his residence. Sheriff Guy says others involved in the online exchange may be charged as well. Both Sheriff Guy and McMinn Co. Director of Schools Lee Parkison say threats against a student or school will not be tolerated.

### Van Dyke House Owner Dies in Fall

A tragic accident has claimed the life of James Raymond "Jim" Long, the man who has been restoring the Van Dyke Mansion on Prospect Hill, the hill behind Genesis Baptist Church on Elizabeth Street. Long was working on the house last Friday afternoon when he fell from the roof. He apparently died instantly. He was 65. He and his wife, Lisa, bought the historic mansion in 2010 and began restoring it. The restoration was almost completed when a tornado blew the roof off and caused other major damage on Nov. 30th, 2016. The Longs vowed to start over again. Long was working on the roof when he fell to his death. The Van Dyke Mansion was built around 1833. It served as a residence for Union General William Sherman for a short time during the Civil War.

#### MAN DROWNS IN RESCUE ATTEMPT

A McMinn County man drowned and a woman was rescued from high water early Sunday morning. Sheriff Joe Guy says the woman was doing meth at a home on County Road 788 when she walked from the house and wandered into the water. Guy says the man went out to get her, but was unsuccessful. The West Polk Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department responded and deployed two boats. The female was unharmed. The male was recovered, but he did not survive. Sheriff Guy says it's unclear if the man was doing meth. The incident remains under investigation. No names have been released.
