#### ♦ GET READY FOR SALES TAX HOLIDAY

Tennessee's annual sales tax weekend is coming up on Friday, July 26th, through Sunday, July 28th. During that period, shoppers can save nearly 10% on more than 150 different items, including clothing, computers, and school supplies. State and local taxes will not be collected on exempt items that cost \$100 or less per item and computers that cost \$1,500 or less. The sales tax holiday weekend is for everyone, not just students and not just Tennesseans. Anyone who wants to shop in Tennessee during the last weekend of July will be eligible to save on sales tax.

#### ♦ HUSTON RECEIVES VIVID AWARD

The Athens City Council's monthly VIVID (Very Important Volunteer Individual) Award was presented to Richy Huston at Tuesday's Council meeting. Huston moved to Athens in 1987 and has tried to live up to his town's nickname, "The Friendly City." He helps out his fellow citizens anytime he can, including helping people out of a ditch after a heavy snow, rescuing pets that have wandered away from home, and helping people remove fallen trees from the homes of driveways after a storm. He is also an avid cyclist, who rides from 3,500 to 5,000 miles per year. During a recent storm, Richy ventured into the street in heavy rain to protect American flags that had been blown away in Downtown Athens. He pulled them out of the street before cars ran over them.

**WEDNESDAY'S MARKET REPORT:** U.S. stocks fell as investors assessed mixed corporate earnings and rising uncertainty around U.S.-China trade. The industrials and energy sectors were hit the hardest. The utilities sector performed well due to lower interest rates. U.S. housing starts declined in June, slightly below economists' forecast. Bank of America reported results ahead of expectations, driven by consumer-banking results and cost management. U.S. Treasuries rose.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average was down 116 points or 0.4% to 27,220. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index was down 18 points or 0.6% to 2,986, and the NASDAQ Composite Index was down 38 points or 0.5% to 8,185.

In commodity markets, the spot price of gold rose \$19.21 to \$1,425.49, and the price of crude oil fell \$1.07 to \$56.55.

The 30-year Treasury yield closed lower at 2.56% and the 10-year Treasury yield finished lower at 2.05%.
