




2001 - Terrorists hijacked passenger jetliners and slammed

TUESDAY'S MARKET REPORT: U.S. equities ended mixed for the day. Technology and consumer staples were the worst-performing sectors. Apple announced at its annual product event that its new TV service will cost \$4.99 and be free for a year to anyone who buys a new iPhone, iPad or Mac. More History from Joe Guy

In a lonely grave in a field north of Niota lies the memory of a remarkable man who saw firsthand the early years of Tennessee history. Isaac Lane was a farmer, an Indian fighter, a militia solder under John Sevier, and an American Patriot during the Revolutionary War.

Born in 1759, Isaac Lane made his way to the Wautauga Settlements by 1778. In 1780, he was part of the Overmountain men who defeated the British at the crucial Battle of Kings Mountain in South Carolina, and upon returning, immediately took up arms against the Chickamauga Cherokees led by Dragging Canoe under the influence of the British government.

Pushing southwest into the Cherokee lands may have first allowed Isaac to see the future area of McMinn County. Long after the war, Isaac Lane would move to McMinn County around 1830, and establish a farm north of present day Niota. Dying in 1851, Lane had lived an eventful life: fighting for the birth of a new nation, seeing Tennessee grow from a frontier to a state, and even seeing the railroad come to what was once the Indian lands he'd once took battle in.
