# Latest Update on Coronavirus

As of Wednesday afternoon, the total number of coronavirus cases in McMinn County stands at 125 with 90 recoveries and 12 deaths. Monroe County has had 53 cases of the virus, 28 recoveries and two deaths. Bradley County's total is 84 cases, 69 recoveries and one death. There have not been any changes for Meigs County. Tennessee's total is 18,532 cases with 309 deaths.

#### **CITY COUNCIL SAYS NO TO BUDGET**

It's back to the drawing board for the Athens City budget for fiscal year 2021. At Tuesday night's City Council meeting, the proposed budget was defeated by a vote of 3 to 2 on the first reading. Those voting no were Mayor Chuck Burris and Council members John Coker and Dick Pelley. The budget had included two new positions--a deputy fire chief and a detective. At least two of the council members said they preferred that the property tax increase not be included in the budget. City Manager C. Seth Sumner says he will be working with Council members to better understand what their expectations are and hopefully get an altered version of the budget to another vote in the near future.

WEDNESDAY'S MARKET **REPORT:** The Dow Jones Industrial Average was up 369 points or 1.5% to 24,576. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index was up 49 points or 1.7% to 2,972, and the NASDAO Composite Index was up 191 points or 2.1% to 9,376.

✓ Researchers at Meharry Medical College in Nashville have developed a new drug that fights COVID-19. Dr. Donald Alcendor says the drug stops the spread of the virus inside the body. He says it works by entering and waiting inside of cells, and when the COVID-19 virus enters the cells, it prevents the virus from replicating. As a result, the coronavirus is shut down completely. Right now clinical trials are taking place at a lab in Brazil.

### **Athens Police/Fire Report**

Members of the Athens City Council heard the reports on crime and fire activity during April at this past Tuesday night's monthly meeting

- Police Chief Cliff Couch reported there were 44 thefts in Athens in April, 12 burglaries, 7 assaults, 4 motor vehicle thefts, and 1 robbery. In addition, police issued 33 citations for moving violations. There were 54 traffic accidents in April, with 3 injuries. Twenty-one of the accidents occurred on private property. There are currently two vacancies on the Athens Police Department.
- Fire Chief Brandon Ainsworth reported that firefighters responded to 59 calls in April. Ten calls were to fires, 18 were for rescue and emergency medical service, and there were 22 false alarms. There were three calls to vehicle accidents with injuries and there were 2 vehicle fires. Firefighters responded to a swift water rescue on John J. Duncan Parkway due to flooding as a result of heavy rainfall. Losses from fires in April totaled \$44,450.00.

#### DECISION NOT MADE YET ON FIREWORKS

Athens City Manager C. Seth Sumner says every effort will be made to hold the annual fireworks show at the Athens Regional Park on the 4th of July. Sumner says a decision will be made on or around the first of June. The City of Etowah has already announced that the Etowah fireworks show has been cancelled.
