• Hikers are being told to postpone plans to hike the entire length of the Appalachian Trail this year due to COVID-19. The Appalachian Trail Conservancy made the suggestion because it feels the pandemic makes long-distance hikes unsafe. The Appalachian Trail runs from Georgia to Maine and covers 2,193 miles.

The Tennessee Department of Transportation and the Department of Homeland Security are teaming up to raise public awareness of the increase in traffic fatalities on Tennessee's highways in 2020, a year in which traffic was at an all-time low. Fatalities increased nearly 7% last year, while traffic was down 13% in Tennessee. There were 1,211 fatalities on state highways in 2020. Of those, 396 were unrestrained. TDOT and the THP are asking motorists to obey the speed limit, stay off your phone, don't drive distracted or impaired, and please wear your seat belt.

TODAY IN HISTORY - JANUARY 27th

1756 - Composer Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart was born in Austria.

1825 - Congress approved Indian Territory (present-day Oklahoma), clearing the way for forced relocation of the Eastern Indians on the "Trail of Tears."

1832 - British author Lewis Carroll was born. He wrote "Alice's Adventures In Wonderland."

1880 - Inventor Thomas Edison was granted a patent for the electric incandescent lamp on this date, and then proceeded to "light up our lives."

1885 - Composer Jerome Kern was born. He wrote such songs as "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes," "I've Told Every Little Star," and "Ol' Man River."

1919 - David Seville, creator of "The Chipmunks," was born.

1924 - Lenin's body was laid in a marble tomb on Red Square near the Kremlin.

1927 - United Independent Broadcasters Inc. started a radio network with contracts that included 16 stations. The company later became the Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS).

1939 - President Franklin D. Roosevelt approved the sale of U.S. war planes to France.

1959 - NASA selected 110 candidates for the first U.S. space flight.

1967 - Three astronauts were killed when fire swept through their Apollo spacecraft during a test at Cape Kennedy. They were Virgil Grissom, Ed White, and Roger Chaffee.

1973 - The U.S. and North Vietnam signed a cease-fire agreement.

1977 - The Vatican reaffirmed the ban on female priests in the Roman Catholic Church.
