

State News

- ◆ Expelled former lawmaker Rep. Jeremy Durham of Franklin, is facing new driving under the influence charges in Florida, making that the second round. Durham was arrested in Tallahassee and is being held in the Leon County Detention Center. His mugshot is being withheld because he claimed under Florida law he was a government employee. Durham is still facing two counts of DUI from an incident in Davidson County last year when he was also charged with resisting arrest, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and possession of drug paraphernalia. Durham served in the House of Representatives before he was expelled by fellow lawmakers in 2016 after an investigation by the Attorney General's office found he had sexually harassed at least 22 women. The ex-lawmaker was subsequently hit with fines totaling \$465,000 for campaign finance violations. The state is trying to collect those fines.
- ♦ Gov. Bill Lee says his administration was aware of the qualifications required under Tennessee law before appointing Lizzette Reynolds as education commissioner, rebuffing Democratic lawmakers' criticism that his appointee is not licensed to teach in Tennessee, despite a statute that says she should be qualified to do so. Earlier this week, House Democrats called for Reynolds' resignation after raising questions about whether she met the legal requirements to serve as the top education chief. That's because Reynolds doesn't currently have a teacher's license even though she is currently enrolled in UT Martin's Education Degree Program.
- ◆Two Tennessee lawmakers are continuing the fight to ban corporal punishment in schools. State Senator Heidi Campbell and Representative Jason Powell filed legislation this week to put an end to the law. Tennessee is one of 17 states that allow paddling and spankings in the country. Campbell says corporal punishment sends a message that the way to deal with conflict is through physical violence. Current law allows for punishment for "good cause in order to maintain discipline and order within the public schools." Lawmakers say some of the big school districts like Nashville, Williamson, Murfreesboro, and Shelby have banned the punishment, so it's time to address it throughout the state.
