Wanted Man in Nashville Captured in Monroe County



A man wanted in Nashville was captured by detectives with the Monroe County Sheriff's Office and Monroe County Violent Crime Task Force Friday night. According to the sheriff's office,

detectives were able to track down the man late Friday evening after hours of hard work. The man was reportedly wanted out of Nashville for theft of more than \$10,000. The sheriff's office said the man was located and taken into custody. Detectives recovered a stolen Enterprise truck as well as the stolen property that had been taken with the truck from the Nashville area. Cleveland Deceased Women Identified

In a follow-up to Friday's story found HERE, fire authorities in Bradley County have concluded their investigation into a tragic residential fire that resulted in the loss of two elderly women's lives. The fire occurred at a residence situated on the 100 block of North Brook Drive NE. Upon arrival, responders discovered 93year-old Myrtle Irene Moore and her 68-yearold daughter, Denese Moore, within the premises. Investigators determined that the smoke detector failed to function, failing to warn the occupants. The victims were taken to a nearby hospital where they succumbed to their injuries, mainly smoke inhalation. The fire originated in the kitchen and has been deemed accidental. The fire caused \$70,000 in property and material losses.

Voter Registration Form Discrepancies

A federal judge has determined that Tennessee's voter registration form breaches federal law in anticipation of several significant elections this year. The matter revolves around the voting rights of convicted felons, where discrepancies exist within Tennessee's policy regarding which felons can vote and which cannot. The judge cited clarity issues with the state's voter registration form. Tennessee officials have indicated their intent to explore all legal avenues, suggesting they may pursue an appeal of the ruling.

Spring City Chosen for Revitalization Program

Spring City has been selected by Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development (TNECD) Commissioner Stuart C. McWhorter to join the ninth round of the Tennessee Downtowns program. This initiative spans two years and assists selected communities and their steering committees in implementing revitalization strategies. The Tennessee Downtowns program includes community training based on the National Main Street Center's Four-Point Approach and offers a \$15,000 grant for a downtown improvement project.

Commissioner McWhorter emphasized the importance of investing in rural Tennessee, stating, "The investments we make in rural Tennessee benefit all Tennesseans, and the Tennessee Downtowns program allows us to equip some of our most rural communities with the tools needed to better develop and revitalize their downtown districts,.

TNECD provides the Tennessee Downtowns program to communities that want to pursue the Main Street America

approach to downtown revitalization Other communities chosen for the program include Adamsville, Baxter, Byrdstown, Camden, Decatur, Gleason, Jellico, Loudon, McEwen, Munford, and Wartrace.
