"National Police Association" Scam Letters



Some Englewood residents have received a letter from the "National Police Association" implying that donations to their organization will encourage local city councils to continue funding the police department. This letter is not endorsed by the City of Englewood or McMinn County. Sheriff Guy and Englewood Police Chief Mike Hayes advise residents not to fall for this solicitation. "Sheriff Guy, our City Manager, and I have read the

letter. We agree that this is definitely not credible," said Chief Mike Hayes. "We have never had any correspondence from the "National Police Association" ... we do not recommend anyone sending any donations to them... It is our belief that this is another attempt to prey on people's instinct to want to help law enforcement in any they can, simply because they believe it is the 'right thing to do'." - The Athens City Council held a called meeting Tuesday afternoon and voted to rescind a previously passed motion on June 18th to hold a public hearing about accusations against Council Member Dick Pelley, who has been accused of violating state code for digging holes at Veterans Park and allegedly causing disturbances at the Athens Area Chamber of Commerce, the McMinn Senior Activity Center and TWU. Instead of pursuing a public hearing, the council voted to turn the matter over to the city attorney and authorized him to pursue an ouster suit against Council Member Pelley. After the Tuesday evening vote, Vice Mayor Larry Eaton issued the following statement: "The council wanted to be sure we are fair to councilman Pelley and to ensure proper dual (*sic*) process and making sure we do not have any bias procedures. The courts will ensure he gets a fair change (*sic*) at all charges and we pray for our city to move forward".

Shooter Kills Self near Hamilton Place

Seven Arrested in Monroe County Sex Sting



A shooter fatally shot himself inside an office building near Hamilton Place mall on Monday afternoon, but no one else was harmed, Chattanooga police Sgt. Victor Miller stated at a news conference. Police and other law

enforcement agencies responded to an active shooter report at 2034 Hamilton Place Blvd. shortly after 2 p.m., according to Miller. Sources state that John Schultz, a longtime Investigator & Asbestos Coordinator with the Chattanooga-Hamilton County Air Pollution Control Bureau, entered the office of Executive Director Ron Drumeller along with another staffer, Amber Boles. Schultz became angry with Drumeller and tried to shoot him. The gun misfired, and Schultz ultimately turned the gun on himself. Over 100 law enforcement personnel were present in the nearby mall parking lot. Authorities believe the shooter acted alone and never left the building. FROM LOCAL 3 NEWS....Officers and deputies from multiple departments in Monroe County took seven people between the ages of 28 to 77 into custody for engaging in sexual conversations with an undercover agent posing as a minor online. Most of the men arrested offered \$100 to have sex with who they thought was a 16-year-old female or male. The Monroe County Sheriff's Office Violent Crime Task Force, Sweetwater Police Department, Vonore Police Department and the Covenant Rescue Group teamed up to conduct the sting from Thursday, June 20 to Friday, June 21. A Facebook post from Monroe County Sheriff Tommy Jones says the chats between the suspects and decoy juvenile were explicit. "These conversations were heinous in nature and most included money in exchange for sexual acts," Sheriff Jones said. Jones thanked the Covenant Rescue Group, an organization dedicated to rescuing victims and arresting criminals involved in human trafficking, for spearheading the project.

Security Grants for TN Houses of Worship

The Tennessee Department of Safety and Homeland Security is accepting applications for a grant that will fund security efforts at churches, synagogues, temples and mosques. The deadline to apply is coming up on July 12. "Unfortunately houses of worship can often be soft targets," said Department of Safety and Homeland Security Deputy Commissioner Greg Mays. "By their nature, these locations are easily accessible to large numbers of people and have limited security measures in place, which can make them vulnerable to an attack. With the Houses of Worship Security Grant, eligible organizations can hire trained security professionals who, in an emergency, can mitigate or prevent a tragedy."
