

"Forever" Increasing Prices at USPS



The U.S. Postal Service announced in April that the price of a First-Class Mail "Forever" stamp will increase to 73 cents on July 14, up from the current 68 cents. When introduced in 2007, a

"Forever" stamp cost 41 cents. Other proposed changes include a 5-cent increase for a 1-ounce metered letter to 69 cents, a 3-cent rise for domestic postcards to 56 cents, and a 10-cent increase for international postcards and letters to \$1.65. These changes represent a 7.8% overall increase in mailing costs. Despite these hikes, the cost of renting a Post Office Box remains unchanged, and postal insurance costs will be reduced by 10%. The price of Forever stamps was last raised to 68 cents in January with the upcoming change marking the second increase just this year. These changes are part of the Postal Service's 10-year plan toward profitability. USPS reported a \$6.5 billion loss for fiscal 2023 and projects a \$6.3 billion deficit for 2024.

Athens, Tennessee



A routine TDOT inspection of Knoxville's Gay Street Bridge revealed a compromised steel element, leading to its closure for vehicular and pedestrian traffic. The 1,512-foot bridge, composed of straight, connected triangular pieces, showed a distorted steel piece that could potentially cause buckling. The bridge was

closed out of an abundance of caution, though the damage occurred after last year's inspection. The closure did not impact the downtown parade celebrating the University of Tennessee's national baseball championship.

Historic Bridge Closed Indefinitely

A more detailed inspection by TDOT will continue. Built in 1898, the bridge is Knoxville's oldest over the Tennessee River and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Former Chattanooga Police Chief Facing Charges One Day After Resignation



Former Chattanooga Police Chief Celeste Murphy faces felony and misdemeanor charges after a Tennessee Bureau of Investigation probe. At the request of District Attorney General Pro Tem D.

Michael Dunavant, TBI agents began investigating Murphy's residency in April. The investigation revealed Murphy submitted false information on government documents to establish residency in Chattanooga.

A Hamilton County Grand Jury indicted Murphy on 17 counts, including one count of Illegal Voter Registration, one count of False Entries on Official Registration or Election Documents, three counts of False Entries in Governmental Records, three counts of Forgery, three counts of Perjury, and six counts of Official Misconduct. Murphy surrendered to agents at the Hamilton County Jail and was booked at the Hamilton County Jail and released on a \$19,000 bond. Today in History - June 21

1776 - The final draft of the Declaration of Independence was submitted to the Continental Congress.

1838 - Alexandrina Victoria was crowned Queen Victoria of the United Kingdom at age 19 in Westminster Abbey, London. Her reign of 63 years and seven months, was longer than that of any other British monarch before her, until overtaken by her great-great granddaughter Elizabeth II in 2015.


