McMinn Libraries Get TECH Grants

Tennessee Lawmakers recently announced Technology Grant funding \$12,596 for public libraries in McMinn County. Specifically, the Calhoun Public Library will receive \$2,212 to help cover the cost of desktops, software, monitors, and a barcode scanner. The E.G. Fisher Public Library is set to receive \$9,362 for desktops, laptops, automation, a scanner, and a television. Etowah Carnegie Library will also receive \$1,022 for automation. Technology grants are administered by the Tennessee State Library & Archives, a division of the Secretary of State's Office. These grants are funded through the Library Services Act (LSTA), as administered through the Institute of Museum and Library Services. Each grant is matched with local funds. This year \$373,869 in technology grants was awarded at 98 libraries across the state. These grants are used to purchase or replace computers, software, networking software, and other electronic equipment for library staff and patrons. McMinn Senior Activity Center Expands Opportunities







TODAY IN HISTORY - SEPT 18th

1709 - English writer Samuel Johnson was born. He compiled the first English dictionary.

1789 - The first loan is made to pay the salaries of US Presidents and Congress.

1793 - President George Washington laid the cornerstone of the U.S. Capitol.

1819 - French scientist Jean Foucault was born. He invented the gyroscope, which is used to keep airplanes and ships level.

1837 - Charles Lewis Tiffany and John B. Young co-found a "stationery and fancy goods emporium" in New York City, later renamed in 1853 as "Tiffany & Co."

1927 - The Columbia Phonograph Broadcasting System (later CBS) debuted with a network of 16 radio stations.

1928 - An estimated 4,000 people were killed by the Okeechobee hurricane a hurricane that lashed Florida and the West Indies for five days.

2001 - Letters postmarked Trenton, N.J., that later tested positive for anthrax were sent to the New York Post and NBC anchorman Tom Brokaw.

2014 - Scottish voters rejected a referendum that would have made Scotland an independent country.
