Athens City Council Meeting Today

The Athens City Council will meet today, October 15, 2024, at 6:00 P.M. Key agenda items include a special presentation by Mayor Sherlin, a proclamation for the 200th anniversary of Masonic Lodge Meridian Sun 50, and approval of speed limit reductions and maintenance bids.

The council will hold a public hearing on an ordinance regulating camping within the city limits and discuss tourism fund allocations for 2025. In relation to the camping regulation ordinance, this effectively would ban homeless encampments within the city limits. This would make Athens only the second city in Tennessee to do so.

This ordinance aims to regulate camping within the city limits of Athens, Tennessee, to protect the safety, health, and welfare of its citizens. It defines "camping" as staying at a campsite, which includes setting up bedding, fires, or temporary shelters. The ordinance prohibits camping or sleeping on public sidewalks, streets, alleys, or public property unless authorized by the city code, the mayor in emergencies, or by council approval for special events with adequate insurance. If a campsite is discovered on public property, the city will post a 24-hour notice before removal. During this time, local agencies assisting the homeless will be informed. After the notice period, city departments, with police supervision, will remove the campsite. Personal property removed will be stored by the city for 30 days, allowing individuals to reclaim it. Penalties for violating this ordinance may be mitigated if individuals promptly remove their belongings and any litter after being informed of the violation. Burn Permits Required starting Oct. 15

Beginning October 15, Tennesseans must obtain a free burn permit from the Tennessee Department of Agriculture Division of Forestry (TDF) before burning leaves, brush, or natural debris, including waste from Hurricane Helene. State Forester Heather Slayton emphasized the importance of fire safety due to the increased risk of wildfires from escaped debris burns.

Burn permits are required by law and are only issued when conditions are safe. They can be obtained online at www.BurnSafeTN.org or via the MyTN mobile app from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily. Residents without internet access can call 877-350-BURN (2876) for a permit, Monday through Friday. Burning without a permit is a Class C misdemeanor.

For safety, notify your local fire department before burning, avoid burning on windy days, and never leave a fire unattended. Visit www.BurnSafeTN.org for more safety tips.

Early Voting Begins Wednesday

Tennessee Secretary of State Tre Hargett reminds voters that early voting for the Nov. 5 State and Federal General Election starts on Wednesday, Oct. 16. The early voting period will run through October 31st.

Hargett urged all registered voters to take advantage of early voting, emphasizing its convenience. Voters can access polling locations, hours, and sample ballots via the GoVoteTN app or GoVoteTN.gov.

Voters must bring a valid photo ID to the polls, such as a driver's license or photo ID issued by the Tennessee Department of Safety and Homeland Security, by the Tennessee state government, or by the federal government. All are acceptable even if they are expired. College student IDs are not acceptable.
