Missing Children Found in GA

On October 22, 2024, Athens Police responded to a report of five missing children from the Department of Children's Services (DCS) office in Athens. The children's parents, Kurtis and Sawana Pendergrass, fled the office after being informed that the children would be placed in state custody. The family left in a white GMC Acadia, prompting authorities to issue felony warrants for Kurtis Pendergrass, 30, for defying a court order.

Investigations indicated the family was in Georgia, and Athens Police worked closely with local and federal law enforcement. Deputies from Hart County, Georgia, located all five children safely, and both parents were arrested. The children are now under the care of Georgia Family and Children Services. Further updates are expected as the case develops.

More Athens City Council Recap

Several motions passed at the recent regular Athens City Council meeting:

Revisions to a lease agreement between Tennessee Wesleyan University and the city concerning the property of the former Ingleside School passed. TWU has proposed building a sports complex at that location. Once completed, the complex would be used primarily by TWU, however citizens and the general public will have access to it as well.

Decorum and Rules of Engagement were changed to limit the time of citizens comments to 3 minutes instead of 5 minutes.

The order of business of regular city council meetings moved "Citizens Comments" from Item #7 to Item #13, which places them at the end of the Agenda.

One motion concerning a landowner's request for annexation of property located on County Road 126 (AKA Milton Road) by George Andrew Hodges was declined rather than being tabled, as we had previously reported.

Bridge Repair on I-75

The Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) has begun repairs on the I-75 bridge over the Tennessee River near mile marker 74 in Loudon County. The right southbound lane has been closed since Saturday evening, and the project is expected to be completed by November 2.

"What we're doing is they're installing a splice plate, which basically is going to be there with the two steel girders connect. This is something that we have done before over bridges and it's really not that much out of the norm," said TDOT spokesperson Mark Nagi.

TDOT crews are working around the clock, and drivers should anticipate delays, especially with upcoming traffic for Tennessee football games. Travelers are urged to stay alert and allow extra time for their commutes during this period.



Picture perfect weather ushered in toe tapping live entertainment on two stages, the beat of Native American drums, the tantalizing smell of festival food, all sorts of tempting items for sale from local businesses and 330 arts, crafts and food vendors plus a crowd of over 20,000 visitors!
