Athens City Council

The Athens City Council met in regular session last week and here is a recap of the proceedings.

A Proclamation was presented to Mike Bevins for his many years of service and leadership on the Athens City School Board. Another Proclamation was presented to signify "School Board Appreciation Week" which is taking place this week. The council also issued a resolution to declare this week as "Athens Flood Awareness Week.

A motion was made to rescind the December 17, 2024 vote to demolish North City School. No second was made and no vote was taken. The motion was in regard to the rapid growth of new homes in the city and maybe needing the building after all.

The City Planning Commission recently approved a plat to build 90 new homes between Keith Lane and Cedar Springs Road. Construction of those homes is scheduled to start in February. Sources have indicated a plat for another 90 new homes will be presented to the Planning Commission for their consideration. If it is approved, those homes will be built just off Decatur Pike on property formerly owned by the Seaton family.

The council authorized the city manager to contact an architecture firm to begin designing a new fire station to be constructed on Elizabeth Street near Cedar Grove Cemetery. The fire station is expected to cost around 4 to 5 million dollars.

After establishing a commanding lead at halftime Coach Baker slowed things down in the second half with all starters sitting out the 4th quarter. McHone led all scorers with 16, followed by King with 12, Brown with 10, Kranz with 9, Schaumburg with 5, and Smith with 4. **Final Score** - **Meigs County 56,** Sweetwater 27.

The Tigers couldn't overcome the 14 point deficit they faced after the 1st quarter. The defense settled in afterwards and held the Wildcats in check during the 2nd and 3rd quarters, but the offense could not do its part. Jaxon Hope and Mason Davis paced scoring with 14 apiece while Malone, Armour, Powell, and Eli Hope combined for the remaining 10.

Central Basketball Round-Up



The McMinn Central Charger and Chargerette basketball teams played district 3-2A games on both Thursday and Friday evening. On Thursday, the Chargerettes routed Sweetwater 83-34. Karina Bystry surpassed 2300 career points as she led the team with 28 points, 8 rebounds, 5 assists, and 6

steals. Reagan Baker scored 11 points. Alahna Powell added 10 points. The win improved the Chargerettes to 21-1 overall and 5 -0 in district 3-2A.

The Chargers defeated the Sweetwater Wildcats 59-54. Daylen Spradling led Central with 26 points, 4 assists, and 3 steals. Carter Anderson added 13 points. Ray McCarty scored 12 points and led the team with 8 rebounds. Will Benton returned from missing 3 games due to an ankle injury and scored 8 points and grabbed 5 rebounds. The win improved the Chargers' record to 7-14 overall and 2-3 in district play.

On Friday, the Chargerettes built a 50-16 halftime lead in route to an 81-44 district victory over the Tellico Plains Lady Bears. Karina Bystry led Central with 29 points and 9 rebounds. Reagan Baker scored 17 points. Malea Masingale scored 10 points, grabbed 7 rebounds, and led the team with 6 assists and 3 steals. The Chargerettes are now 22-1 overall and 6-0 in district 3-2A.

The Chargers led the top 5 ranked Tellico Plains Bears 32-27 early in the second half but couldn't hold the lead. Tellico Plains led 41-39 after three quarters, and the Bears outscored Central 19-9 in the fourth quarter to defeat the Chargers 60-48. Ray McCarty led the Chargers with 11 points and grabbed 7 rebounds. Carter Anderson scored 10 points. Will Benton scored 8 points and led the team with 11 rebounds. The Chargers fell to 7-15 overall and 2-4 in district 3-2A.

"Pearl" clutches win against Tennessee



In a nail-biter that felt more like a boxing match than a basketball game, the Auburn Tigers narrowly defeated the Tennessee Volunteers 53-51

on Saturday night. The intense, low-scoring game culminated with Vols guard Zakai Zeigler missing a potential go-ahead three-pointer in the closing seconds.

Auburn head coach Bruce Pearl commended Tennessee's toughness, praising head coach Rick Barnes and his players for their physicality and grit. Pearl also noted the mutual respect between the two teams, highlighting how closely contested the matchup was.

Despite the loss, Tennessee's performance raised no concerns about its ability to succeed in March. A few different calls or a made shot at the buzzer could have easily flipped the outcome in favor of the Vols.

This game featured two of college basketball's top teams, with Auburn capitalizing on home-court advantage. Tennessee, however, is poised to grow stronger as the season progresses, learning valuable lessons from the intense contest.

The Volunteers return to Knoxville for a three-game homestand starting Tuesday at 7 p.m., where they will face ninth-ranked Kentucky. The game will air live on ESPN from Food City Center.
