#### Athens City Council Reviews Budget, Fire Station Plans, and Charter Changes



The Athens City Council met for a work session on Monday, Sept. 8, covering a broad agenda of financial, infrastructure, and policy matters.

Council reviewed Athens City Schools' FY 2025–26 Budget Amendment #1 and considered design and construction plans for Fire Station #3 presented by Wold Architect & Engineers. Additional building projects on the agenda included renovating the house at Regional Park into Parks & Recreation offices and renovations and expansion at City Hall, both with Allen & Hoshall.

Infrastructure items included awarding Bid RFB 25-11 for Mt. Verd Industrial Park improvements, reviewing amendments to the floodplain section of the zoning ordinance, and purchasing equipment and services for traffic signal maintenance and coordination at Exit 49. Council also discussed an or-

dinance to amend city code on permanent stormwater management.

Several resolutions were introduced: to amend the City Charter to remove fixed salary provisions for the Mayor and Council and allow compensation to be set by ordinance; to apply for an Atlanta Braves Foundation grant for renovations at Brody Ellis Field; and to declare certain city property as surplus for disposal. Council also heard a rezoning request for 2201 Decatur Pike from business to medium-density residential.

Councilmember items included funding for the Mid-East Tennessee Community Chorus, plans for a Veterans Parade, possible charter changes to add party affiliation and term limits for school board elections, proposals for new community centers and swimming pools, upgrading security cameras at all parks, and a firing range at Public Works. In board and committee matters, Abby Burke Carroll requested appointment to the Council Advisory Committee, and Frances Witt-McMahan was reappointed to the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission.

#### Scam Suspect Arrested After Hours-Long Operation in Englewood



The McMinn County Sheriff's Office arrested **26-year-old Ziyi Lu of Coral Springs, Fla.**, Tuesday evening after a several-hours sting in the Zion Hill community near Englewood. Authorities say Lu attempted to collect \$12,000 from a local woman targeted in a phone scam by someone posing as a federal agent.

Sheriff Joe Guy and investigators,

working with the TBI and Drug Task Force, coordinated with the victim to keep the scammer on the phone while setting up surveillance. Lu was taken into custody when he arrived to meet the victim and is believed to have ties to a Chinese organized crime group.

He is charged with **criminal conspiracy of theft** and **financial exploitation of an elderly or vulnerable person**, and is being held at the McMinn County Jail on a \$120,000 bond. The investigation is ongoing. *Source: Joe Guy, McMinn Co. Sheriff.*

# Aguilar's Moment: Tennessee Prepares for Georgia Showdown

Joey Aguilar faces a defining game this Saturday as the Tennessee Volunteers host the Georgia Bulldogs in a primetime SEC clash. The matchup carries extra weight after a turbulent offseason for the Vols: former QB Nico Iamaleava transferred to UCLA following an NIL dispute, leaving Tennessee with an inexperienced quarterback room and a high-stakes decision for coach Josh Heupel. Aguilar, who transferred from Appalachian State to UCLA and then back to Tennessee, now has a chance to make a statement.

Through two games, Aguilar has impressed with accurate throws, mobility to stress defenses, and a deep-ball threat that was missing from last year's offense. He's averaging 9.1 yards per attempt and 13.7 per completion, highlighting his potential against top-level competition. Coach Heupel also praised Aguilar's leadership, noting the quarterback's encouragement of backup George MacIntyre during the Week 2 win over East Tennessee State. "Great teammate," Heupel said.

Tennessee will face Georgia without key cornerbacks Jermod McCoy (torn ACL) and Rickey Gibson III (injured), leaving sophomore Colton Hood and freshman Ty Redmond to step up in the secondary. But Georgia's offense has shown signs of struggle, scoring just 28 points against FCS Austin Peay, and QB Gunner Stockton has struggled with throwing accuracy in the early season. The Bulldogs may not be the unstoppable force many expect.

A win would be more than a statement on the scoreboard. For Aguilar, it would underscore the balance of player empowerment and coaching authority in modern college football—proving that the right player, in the right situation, can change a program's trajectory. With both sides showing vulnerabilities, this matchup could define the trajectory of the SEC race—and Aguilar's season.

# Athens Police Seize Dogs, Charge Owners with Animal Cruelty

On Sept. 9, Athens Police responded to 507 West Bank Street after reports of aggressive dogs running loose and damaging property. Officers found multiple dogs on the property, some charging at them, and the owner unable to control the animals. With help from the Athens Animal Shelter, McMinn County Humane Society, and Athens Fire Department, three dogs were captured outside and four more were later recovered from inside the dilapidated residence.

Police obtained a search warrant after the owner admitted to having additional dogs inside and revealed that a mother and six puppies had starved to death earlier because he was unable to care for them. All recovered animals were transported to the Humane Society for treatment and assessment. The owners now face multiple charges, including aggravated animal cruelty, neglect, and facilitation of neglect. The male owner also allegedly threatened to shoot officers during the encounter, leading to the seizure of two firearms.

Deputy Chief Jason B. Garren praised the officers and partner agencies for working under difficult conditions to complete the hourslong operation, emphasizing their persistence in safely recovering the animals. Authorities urge anyone who suspects animal abuse or neglect to contact the Athens Police Department at 423-744-2730.
