#### AACA Revives "Arts on the Side" with Community Meal and Interactive Arts Event




The Athens Area Council for the Arts (AACA) will host its next *Arts on the Side* event on Tuesday, November 18, at The Arts Center in Athens. The evening will feature a community meal, visual arts activities, and an interactive play reading open to the public.

The event begins with a soup supper, including a vegan option, catered by ARAMARK at 5:30 p.m. in the Peggy Dow Performance Center. At 6 p.m., participants can enjoy a variety of hands-on arts experiences in the Peggy Dow Center and Visual Arts Wing. Activities include clay handbuilding with Patricia Shook, guided acrylic painting with Nancy Kyzer, and collage art with Holly Doucette and Jan Burleson.

At 7 p.m., Athens Community Theatre will present a table read of *Mean Girls: The Musical* (rated PG-13) in the Sue E. Trotter Black Box Theater. The reading will be led by Michael Webb.

Arts on the Side builds on the success of AACA's September community meal and Pickin' Party, aiming to bring people together through food, fellowship, and creativity. The event also marks the revival of a former AACA lunchtime series of the same name, designed to make the arts accessible to all.

The program encourages community members to explore new art forms and connect with others in a welcoming environment. Participation in the table read is open to everyone—guests can choose to read a role or simply listen. All activities are free and open to the public. ### Athens' Pumpkintown 2025 Becomes Largest Festival Yet

When the 2025 Friendly City Festivals group held its first Pumpkintown planning session back in June after a successful MooFest, we all agreed on one thing — to make the 23rd annual Pumpkintown the best ever! And, after months, weeks and days of planning, we feel our wish came true on Saturday, October 11th! Picture perfect weather ushered in toe tapping live entertainment on three stages, the beat of Native American drums, the tantalizing smell of festival food, all sorts of tempting items for sale from local businesses and 325 arts, crafts and food vendors plus a record crowd of over 35,0009 visitors! So, thanks to the support of our community, sponsors, vendors and visitors, we think Pumpkintown 2025 was a resounding success!

And that success is due to the support of several community groups that sponsored a variety of activities that make a festival stand out.

Hosted by the McMinn Regional Humane Society, the Mutt Strutt and Doggie Costume Contest featured over 52 pets in their Halloween finery and raised over \$800 for Rescue Riders in addition to two dogs and two cats adopted during the Paw Print Activity at Fullers Frame Shon.

#### Tennessee Looks to Rebound as Kentucky Seeks to End SEC Home Drought

Another Saturday night at Kroger Field brings another chance for Kentucky football to break a streak that has haunted the Wildcats for more than two years. The task, however, won't be easy. Tennessee rolls into Lexington seeking redemption after a humbling defeat at Alabama, while Kentucky is desperate to stop its free fall in the SEC.

The Wildcats (2–4, 0–4 SEC) have not won a conference home game since toppling Florida in September 2023, which was a stunning nine straight SEC losses inside their own stadium. To make matters worse, Tennessee (5–2, 2–2 SEC) has claimed two victories in that same span at Kroger Field. If the Vols prevail again Saturday night, they'll have more SEC wins in Lexington since 2023 than Kentucky itself — a statistic that underscores just how badly the Wildcats need this one.

Both teams enter bruised and searching for answers. Tennessee was overpowered 37–20 in Tuscaloosa, while Kentucky suffered a crushing 16–13 overtime loss to Texas, a game it largely controlled before late mistakes and questionable decisions cost them the win.

Kickoff is set for 7:45 p.m. ET on the SEC Network. According to FanDuel, Tennessee is a 9.5-point favorite, with the over/under at 53.5 points. The weather forecast calls for classic fall football conditions — low 60s at kickoff, dipping into the 50s with a slight chance of light rain.

The all-time series between these border rivals dates back to 1893, but it has long been one-sided. Tennessee holds a commanding 84–26–9 advantage, including wins in 35 of the last 40 meetings.

For Tennessee, the focus this week has been on execution and consistency. Wide receivers coach **Kelsey Pope** credited the maturity and growth of young playmakers such as **Braylon Staley** and **Mike Matthews**, who have stepped into larger roles midseason.

On defense, outside linebackers coach **Levorn Harbin** emphasized discipline as his unit prepares for Kentucky's physical offensive front and power run game.

For Kentucky, the stakes are high. A win would snap the SEC drought, calm growing frustration around head coach **Mark Stoops**, and keep faint bowl hopes alive. For Tennessee, it's about staying in the SEC East race and proving that last week's setback was just a stumble, not a slide. Under the lights in Lexington, one team will leave with its season revived — the other, with even more questions than before.
