One Injured in Side-by-Side Accident Saturday Evening



One person was airlifted to a Knoxville hospital after a side-by-side accident Saturday evening in a field off County Road 602 near Athens.

According to officials, a 2024 Honda Pioneer carrying four occupants overturned around 6 p.m., ejecting one person from the vehicle. The injured individual was treated on scene by first responders and AMR paramedics before being transported to the McMinn County Airport, where a LifeStar helicopter airlifted the patient to UT Medical Center in Knoxville.

Responding agencies included Etowah Rural Fire, Claxton Fire, and Athens Rural Fire Departments. Etowah Rural Deputy Chief Dustin Ruebush served as incident commander.

Tennessee Rolls Past Kentucky, Sets Sights on Oklahoma

Quarterback Joey Aguilar led No. 17 Tennessee to a 56–34 win over Kentucky on Saturday night at Kroger Field, guiding an offense that posted 504 total yards and seven different touchdowns. Aguilar completed 20 of 26 passes for a season-high 396 yards and three scores, averaging nearly 20 yards per completion as the Vols (6–2, 3–2 SEC) improved to 17–0 under Josh Heupel when scoring 50 or more points.

Receivers Chris Brazzell II (138 yards), Mike Matthews (107), and Braylon Staley (105) each topped 100 yards — the Vols' first trio to do so since 2019. Running backs DeSean Bishop, Star Thomas, and Peyton Lewis all added touchdowns, giving Tennessee four rushing scores on the night.


Defensively, Tennessee forced two turnovers, including a 45-yard interception return for a touchdown by safety Edrees Farooq. Linebacker Edwin Spillman led all players with 15 tackles, and lineman Dominic Bailey notched a sack. The win marked Tennessee's fifth straight over Kentucky and fourth consecutive in Lexington.

Despite the victory, defensive struggles continued. Kentucky quarterback Cutter Boley threw for 330 yards and five touchdowns as the Vols allowed several long plays. Tennessee currently ranks near the bottom of the SEC in total and pass defense, though its 14 forced turnovers are tied for the league lead.

Heupel and his players acknowledged tackling and consistency remain key issues as the Vols prepare for their next challenge — a primetime showdown with No. 18 Oklahoma (6–2, 2–2 SEC) Saturday night at Neyland Stadium.


The "Dark Mode" game will feature Tennessee's return home and a chance to build momentum entering November. Heupel called on fans to make the "Neyland Effect" felt, saying the atmosphere will be crucial as the Vols look to stay in the SEC and playoff hunt.
