Collected coats will be distributed through United Way of Monroe County and other local community partners serving families in need across our branch communities.



The City of Athens Public Works Department announces the following traffic notices:

Noon Book Discussion at E.G. Fisher Public Library on November 12



Dark Mode Turns Dim as Vols Fall 33–27 to Oklahoma

No. 14 Tennessee's late rally came up short Saturday night as No. 18 Oklahoma escaped Neyland Stadium with a 33–27 victory before a sellout crowd of 101,915.

The Volunteers (6–3, 3–3 SEC), wearing their "Dark Mode" uniforms, outgained the Sooners 456–351 but were undone by three costly first-half turnovers that led to 13 Oklahoma points.

Tennessee struck first with a Joey Aguilar touchdown pass to Braylon Staley, but a fumble return for a score and four field goals by Oklahoma kicker Tate Sandell — including two from 55 yards — gave the Sooners a 16–10 halftime lead.

Aguilar threw for 393 yards and three touchdowns, including a 54-yard strike to Staley and a late 15-yard score to Mike Matthews that cut the deficit to 26–24 with under two minutes remaining. However, Oklahoma recovered the ensuing onside kick and sealed the win with a 1-yard touchdown run by quarterback John Mateer.

Defensively, Tennessee's Edrees Farooq recorded 10 tackles and two forced fumbles, while Edwin Spillman added an interception and nine stops.

The loss likely ends Tennessee's playoff hopes, but the Vols will regroup during their open week before hosting New Mexico State for Homecoming on Nov. 15.
