Downtown Athens Gears Up for MooFest: Street Closures Begin Friday, June 6




Final preparations are underway for MooFest, one of Athens' most anticipated annual events, which takes place on Saturday, June 7. To ensure a safe and successful festival, local officials have announced a **full street closure beginning Friday, June 6 at 3:30 PM**. All vehicles must be removed from the festival area by this time to allow crews to set up stages, booths, and safety barriers.

Event organizers are working closely with the city to ensure clear signage is posted in advance to alert drivers and residents of the closure. "We appreciate everyone's cooperation in helping us prepare downtown for

the event," a spokesperson said. "Removing vehicles on time is essential to keeping everything on schedule and ensuring safety for everyone attending."

The MooFest footprint will span downtown Athens, including high-traffic areas near the **Market Pavilion**, **Courthouse Steps**, and **Eureka Trail**, where attractions like agricultural exhibits, children's activities, and more than 300 vendor booths will be located. Local businesses and streets around the **Market Park Stage**, **Lifestyle Stage**, and **Downtown Beauty Lounge Stage** will also be affected by the closure and festival setup.

Residents and visitors should expect limited access to parking in the downtown area and are encouraged to plan ahead. Alternative routes and designated parking zones will be provided where possible. Public safety teams will be on-site to assist with traffic flow and pedestrian movement throughout the event.

Higher Utility Bills Looming: AUB Considers Rate Increase

After completing an extensive cost of service survey and following consultation with the Tennessee Comptroller's staff, the Athens Utilities Board (AUB) held the first reading recently of a proposed natural gas rate adjustment.

The Tennessee Comptroller requires municipal water, wastewater, and natural gas utilities charge sufficient retail rates to ensure positive annual net revenues. These rate changes are essential to maintain the financial stability of the gas department, and to continue safe, reliable delivery of natural gas to the Athens community.

Effective July 1, 2025, AUB will increase the monthly availability fee from \$6.00 to \$10.50. A second increase of \$2.00 to the availability fee will take effect on July 1, 2026. Additionally, there will be a \$0.02 per decatherm increase to the natural gas commodity rate. This is the first increase to AUB's availability fee in 22 years.

"These decisions are never easy, and we understand the impact any increase can have on our customers," said Craig Brymer, Superintendent of Natural Gas at AUB. "But after thorough analysis and discussions, it's clear that these changes are necessary to maintain the level of service and safety our customers rely on. We're committed to being transparent and fiscally responsible as we plan for the future."

The final reading and approval of the rate change will occur at the June AUB Board meeting.



Athens City Schools Offering Free Summer Meals for Children

Athens City Schools is once again partnering with the USDA to offer free summer meals to children 18 and under through the Summer Nutrition Program. Running from **June 2 through July 18**, the initiative ensures that local children continue to receive nutritious meals even while school is out.

The main drive-thru meal service will be held Monday through Friday from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at Athens City Intermediate School, located at 255 Keith Lane. Families can pick up meals without needing to exit their vehicles, making it a convenient option for busy schedules.


In addition to the main site, several satellite locations will be serving meals during specific time windows:

- Forrest Hills Apartments 11:35 to 11:55 a.m.

- North City School 1:00 to 1:20 p.m.

The SUN Meals program ensures that kids receive the nourishment they need to stay healthy and active during the summer months. Meals are completely free and available to all children under 19, with no registration required.

A new mural featuring President Ronald Reagan, a bald eagle, and the American flag was unveiled this week at the corner of N. Jackson Street and W. Washington Avenue, on the side of the Athens Chamber of Commerce building.
