177 New Laws Take Effect in Tennessee on July 1



Beginning July 1, Tennesseans will see the impact of 177 new laws passed by the state legislature, covering a wide range of issues including education, criminal justice, immigration, healthcare, and child welfare.

Among the most notable changes is the expansion of the state's school voucher program and the introduction of new immigration laws passed during a special legislative session earlier this year.

A full list of the new laws is available through the <u>Tennessee</u> <u>General Assembly's website and public information offices</u>.


Key changes include:

- Harsher Penalties for Child Abuse and underage hemp sales
- **Stronger consequences** for non-consensual, exploitative photography
- Foster care services extended to young adults up to age 23

- Laser pointer misuse near vehicles or aircraft now a criminal offense
- New protections against organized retail crime
- Reporting requirement for foreign buyers of Tennessee farmland
- Mandatory behavioral training for some misdemeanor offenders
- Hybrid learning days allowed during extreme weather
- Hospitals must provide post-birth health info to new mothers
- Wineries exempted from the liquor-by-the-drink tax

These changes reflect growing state attention on child safety, public health, law enforcement, and consumer protections.

Athens Fire Department Installs Safe Haven Baby Box



A new Safe Haven Baby Box will be officially blessed on June 27 in Athens, providing a safe and anonymous option for parents to legally surrender a newborn in crisis. The box is located at the Athens Fire Department at 815 N. Jackson St.

The addition marks a significant step for the city in protecting infants and offering compassionate alternatives to abandonment. Athens joins over 350 locations nationwide—22 of them in Tennessee—equipped with these secure, climate-controlled boxes that notify first responders immediately when a baby is placed inside.

The project was made possible with support from local advocate Richelle Simcox and the Safe Haven Baby Boxes organization, founded by Monica Kelsey. Since 2017, more than 150 newborns nationwide have been safely surrendered using these boxes.

Each case is handled in cooperation with the Department of Family Services to ensure the child's well-being and future care.
