A family dispute turned deadly Sunday night in Meigs County, • leaving one man dead following a confrontation on Shiloh Road.

Man Killed in Family Altercation

in Meigs County

According to District Attorney General Richard Johnson, the incident occurred around 10:00 p.m. at a family compound where several relatives live on the same property. The victim, 59-year-old Jackie Allen Fairbanks, had reportedly been drinking with two of his grandsons when he became violent and began attacking a woman.

The grandsons ran to get their father, who arrived with a pistol and found Fairbanks still assaulting the woman. Authorities say Fairbanks then threatened his son with a long, silver-colored object. The son reportedly fired a warning shot into the wall before shooting multiple times, striking Fairbanks in the femoral artery. He attempted to stop the bleeding using a belt as a tourniquet, but Fairbanks died at the scene.

The Meigs County Sheriff's Office, the District Attorney's office, and the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation are investigating. No charges have been filed at this time.

Final Weeks for "Food for Fines" at E.G. Fisher Library



E.G. Fisher Public Library is reminding patrons that its annual *Food for Fines* program ends July 31, offering a few more weeks to turn overdue fines into a chance to support local causes.

Through the program, library cardholders can donate nonperishable, unexpired food and hygiene items to receive \$1 in overdue fine forgiveness per item, with a maximum of \$50 per account. Donations will benefit the library's blessing box, care cabinet, local pet shelter, and other community food pantries.

Accepted items must be unopened, in original packaging, and have at least a one-year shelf life. Suggested donations include canned

goods, boxed meals, hygiene products, and pet supplies. A variety of items is encouraged, especially for larger donations.

Items can be dropped off during regular hours at the library, located at 1289 Ingleside Avenue in Athens. The program applies to overdue fines only and does not cover fees for lost or damaged items. For more information, call 423-745-7782.

The Overhill Lecture Series continues Thursday, July 10 at 7:00 p.m. at the historic Etowah Gem Theater with a presentation on Sequoyah, the Cherokee leader who developed the Cherokee Syllabary.

Birthplace Museum in Vonore, will explore the life of Sequovah (1776–1843), who was not only the creator of the written Cherokee language but also a father, soldier, silversmith, blacksmith, and statesman. After 12 years of dedication, Sequovah and his daughter introduced the syllabary in 1821, revolutionizing literacy among the Cherokee people.
